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Characters:

Mean Queen Esmerelda (mezzo)

Snow Drift (soprano)

Boss (baritone)

French Chef (tenor)

Landscaper (mezzo)

Italian maid (baritone)

## **EXCERPT:**

Boss: (storming off) I don't know what yer sayin'! Just do yer' work! That's what I'm payin'

for!

SD: Why can I understand you and he can't?

Chef: Let me see your feet.

SD: My feet?

Chef: I knew it! It's the shoes.

SD: The shoes?

Landscaper: Con-verse.

Chef: Con'verse. Converse'. As in conversation. Listening. Being patient.

Landscaper: Trying. Not closing your mind. Not shutting people out because they're different.

Chef: She's Mexican. I'm French. But we understand each other. It's like the shoes are magic.

Landscaper: Maybe it's because we know what it's like to be the outsider.

SD: Do you understand everything each other says? Wow!

Landscaper: Well, there are some things that we don't get. In those cases, we bring in...

Maid: (entering carrying "The Shoe"): THE SHOE!!

SD: (whispering) Who's that?

(Fleidermaus)Landscaper: SOMETIMES IT'S TOUGH TO UNDERSTAND AND LEADS TO MUCH DESPAIR, HOW TO UNDERSTAND THIS NEW LAND,

DOES ANYBODY CARE?

Chef: THE THREE OF US ARE NOT ALIKE, ITALIAN, MEXICAN AND FRENCH, WHEN WE DON'T GET ONE ANOTHER, THIS SHOE MAKES IT A CINCH!

L/C/M: OH, IT'S THE SHOE, YES, IT'S THE SHOE, THE WONDERS THAT THIS SHOE CAN DO!

HE (I) SAYS (SAY) BONJOUR, SHE (I) HEAR(S) HOLA, THE WONDERS OF THE SHOE!

Add SD: LA—(repeat chorus)

L: SOMETIMES WE SAY IT WITH A SMILE,

Landscaper: But when we have to use words, and we can't find the right ones in the right

Maid: I am Sophia! You are so very, very nice!

Chef: And she sings like a leetle bird! Une petite oiseau!

SD: Why, thank you. My name is Snow Drift. You can call me Snow.

Maid: Grazie for being so nice. Not everyone is nice to us, you know. Anyone that moves from their home country to America can tell you that it is not easy.

Chef: It is not easy to leave behind the land that you know. To leave behind your friends, your school, maybe your grandparents or aunts and uncles.

Landscaper: Then to arrive in a place where everything moves so fast. Everyone but you understands what's going on. You feel lost.

Maid: You feel alone. It is hard to make friends when you don't understand the language.

Chef: It is hard to learn in school when you don't understand the language. I was at the top of my class in my old country. Here, people think I'm not smart because the language is still hard for me.

SD: I don't speak any language but English. I know my friends from other continents...Europe, Africa, South America...speak several languages. I am so impressed with that. I can't imagine if I suddenly moved to Czechoslavkia. I would have to point to everything.

JUST THINK OF WHAT I'D MISS, JUST THINK OF WHAT I'D MISS!

Chef: FOR WITHOUT THE SHOE, YOU'D FUMBLE AND NOT SEE WHAT THERE'S TO SEE,

YOU WOULD CLOSE YOUR EARS TO NEW IDEAS AND CURIOSITY,

YOU'D MISS OUT ON EXCITING THINGS, THINGS THAT ARE NEW TO YOU,

SD: I'LL LEARN A LANGUAGE RIGHT AWAY, I MAY NOT HAVE THE SHOE,

L: YOU MIGHT NEED TO USE THE BATHROOM AND NOT KNOW- WHAT TO DO,

(giving up; faster again) If she decides to have her entourage stay here at the inn, we'll be on the news, in the magazines, on Entertainment Tonight! Why did I send that housekeeper to town to pick up my order of peacock feathers? She'll be gone for two days. I never dreamed I'd need her. (*Pirates of Penzance*)

Chef: Put his hand on the shoe. Let's try it. (All touch shoe) The Mean Queen put poison on the apple. Your "housekeeper" is really Snow Drift. (Boss gasps) Yep, the great, great granddaughter of Snow White herself.

Landscaper: (entering) She is wise and very kind. She is open to others who are different. I see you gave him the Shoe. I wanted to give him the Boot.

Boss: Now, that I can understand you...now, that I can really talk to you, I'm speechless. I can't believe you saved me. I've been so mean to you.

Chef: Sometimes people are mean out of ignorance. Ignorance doesn't mean stupid. It means not understanding something.

SD: Sometimes it's not trying or not wanting to understand.

Landscaper: Think of that redwood tree that I am going to plant for you. It was shipped here from California. It is going to live here, grow here, take root here. For it to be able to live, we're going to have to take care of it, nurture it, water it. It's going to need our help.

Boss: I'm starting to get it. I'm going to have to work at it. I'm going to have to be open minded. I'm going to have to go out of my way to help others. People that talk differently, have different customs, need my help to take root in a new place.

L/C/SD: IT'S ALL A MELTING POT! B: A MELTING POT! L/C/SD: A MELTING POT!

SD: SEE SARIS MADE IN INDIA, C/L: THERE'S FRENCH PERFUME AND RUSSIAN HATS.
